









- Across the United States, highway crashes are the most frequent type of *fatal workplace event*, accounting for one in four worker fatalities in 2005.¹
- From 2003 to 2005 there were 576 work-related deaths in Ohio. Forty-one percent (235) of those were transportation-related; 23% involved crashes on public roadways (Fig. 1).
- Nearly three-quarters (73%) of Ohio workers killed in transportation incidents in 2005 were aged 25 to 64; workers aged 45-54 had the highest frequency of transportation-related deaths in 2005 (19/28%). There were no transportation-related fatalities among workers aged 16 to 19 (Fig.2).
- There were over 9.5 million workers employed in Transportation and Material Moving occupations in the United States in 2005 (US Bureau of Labor Statistics). Approximately eight percent of Ohio's workforce is employed in this sector, which is projected to grow by 12% between 2004 and 2014 (Ohio Dept. of Job and Family Services²).
- Ohio ranked 11th highest in the United States in the number of transportation-related fatalities of workers in 2005.¹
